In the 1990's I consulted a garage run by one of his former employees when I had electronic problems with the MG Maestro (although this garage did not find the fault, a friend of mine later did). Dear Brian and Jacky, We had planned to come down to Dorset this weekend for a few days and to call in to see you. BUT the weather seems to be a bit against us. Our caravan site gets soggy with just a shower and just now is underwater in places. So our trip is post-poned until the weather improves. We will be down for Beaulieu but that's a few weeks away. We had a great outing on Sunday for Drive It Day. We did a round trip of 76 miles in the sunshine round the north Oxfordshire and south Northamptonshire lanes. It was great. We took Molly the Traveller and she enjoyed it as she hasn't been out much lately. She is due her MOT next month but David doesn't anticipate any trouble. Rupert sailed through his MOT a couple of weeks ago so David is a happy bunny. Hope to see you soon when the weather improves, Best wishes to you both, Pam and David Holton (DMMOC 272)

Hi Laurie. First of all I would like to thank you so much for your help.

Restoring a Traveller was a dream that I've had for a very long time and I was doing so well. My father in law had the car ('G' reg) in the garage for years and was going to scrap her so I bought it from him. when I got her home and started stripping her down, it was apparent that there was a lot of rust; but being a determined sort of person, I took the bull by the horns and took the project on.

I have spent just shy of £800 on the panels and many many hours cutting and welding. This is what has been done so far: 4x floor panels, box and box extensions on both sides, all inner and outer floor under sills, 4x spring hangers and took great care in taking measurements to make sure the car wont crab up the road, both rear inner wheel arch repair panels, 2x rear bumper iron fixings, bootwell repair panel, 1x tie plate, 2x inner flinch panels, 1x flinch extension panel, 2x door hinge pillars and covers and, yes the doors will fit, new bushes in rear suspension. All that is left to do is to clean some welding up, finish a few patches and weld a cross member in which i have bought. all the panels have been bought from Bull Motif. I think this project will be perfect for someone that has a traveller with good wood etc but the body is rotted out and swap everything from one shell to the other. This is rolling shell with no engine and gearbox but comes with the roof, bonnet, front grill and side alloy body panels and glass. At the moment i am selling lots of parts from the car as i don't know if I am going to be able to sell the shell, but when this month's Newsletter come out I may well still have the seats, doors etc. The only reason I have to give this dream up is because I've recently found out that I am losing sight in both eyes and I know in my heart that I will never be able to finish her and it would be so nice for someone to finish what I have started. As far as the price is concerned, I am happy with sensible offers my phone number is 07834368354, many kind regards, Paul.

# Mike Brewster's Restoration



# Restoration of "Lily May" a 1964 Morris Minor.

If you do a restoration on your car, you must have an understanding woman who puts up with bits of car in the dining room, bathroom lounge etc. I must say my lovely Mo never complained once (bless her).

Luckily the Minor was given to me. The original owner Mrs Hollies Smith bought it from new and used it as her daily transport.

Although there was very little rust in the car it needed some TLC. I bought 5 new tyres, wiring loom, 4 new wings (which were tatty). I completely renewed the braking system including copper brake pipes and copper fuel

line. My wallet was now considerably thinner and it was about to get even thinner! I went to Rainbow Paints in Ferndown—who were very helpful. They had the correct colour code for my Minor-it was Old English White. I bought 5 litres of top coat, some primer, wet and dry paper (400-1200 grade), thinners (top coat and standard). The top coat cellulose was £26 per litre (OUCH!). I had a small compressor—but no good for a complete respray. I had a look on eBay and bought a nice compressor man enough to do the job and a new gravity-fed DeVilbiss spray gun—also 'nice price'. I spent the next few months stripping the car until I was left with a shell. The next few months were spend rubbing down the body work and engine bay until my fingers hurt! (boy, did they hurt!). I was well pleased with the result, however.

My garage is quite small, so doors, bonnet, wings and bootlid etc, were all painted off the car. I then had the laborious task of masking up, but good tips from Neville



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## **BRANCH REBATE SCHEME**

and Brian (nylon coated washing line between the windscreen rubber and body saves removing the glass). Neville is not so bad after all. What a time-saver that was? At last, the body was ready for spraying. Three coats of grey primer and then 'guide coat' in black was applied. I then rubbed it back, just removing the black with 400 grit and finishing with 1200 grit. It looked really good. When ever spraying I always start by completely de-greasing



with panel wipe. Now the hard task. 6 coats of top coat 50/50 and a 7th coat of 75% thinners and 25% paint. That last coat really made it shine! Unfortunately I got a 'run' on the bonnet which I had to re-do, but everything else was OK. I left it 6 weeks before rubbing down the paint work with 1200 grit cutting back and polishing. Now. with the onset of winter, I couldn't do too much, so I just worked on the engine, 49,000 from new. I only had to decoke it and fit new gaskets and repaint—job done! I cleaned, painted and reconditioned many parts like the radiator, wiper motor, petrol pump etc, etc, etc. At last, spring came and then it was time for the tricky part—fitting doors, grille surround and wings. If you have a weird sense of humour—its fun! I fitted stainless steel door frames from a Traveller which looked nice and needed no painting. All the bright work, door handles, bonnet hinges etc were still in good condition. The next job was to fit the engine and gearbox with its bits and pieces. I also fitted an alternator and changed the car over to negative earth so I could have good, decent audio system. The next job was fitting the wiring loom, which I enjoyed. The carpets were like new and the rest of the interior was reasonable. The total restora-



tion time was 2 years (but I am retired!) There were so many things to do, like scraping and cleaning underneath, painting on body schutz, fitting new shackle rubbers to the springs but when you look at your car—finished, but not perfect, but all your own work—it is a good feeling.
