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

Technical Tip (editor)



I was recently tasked with the iob of replacing a steering rack gaiter on a Minor and I don't know about you, but the job always fills me with dread because of the difficulty of getting the inner opening over the end of the rack and then trying to get a clip or cable tie around it and secure.

It occurred to me to do a bit of homework before hand and glue a piece of tubing around 180° of the circumference to contain the cable tie as shown in the photo. (I used heat-shrink as that was all I had)

I used super glue to fix the tubing in three places only (to allow for movement when fitting) and I wasn't sure if it would stand up to the trauma of being fitted. A dollop of washing up liquid helps to get the gaiter over the lip. Once it is in position, you just have to tighten up the cable ties and trim them off. Just run the steering from side to side to make sure the gaiter doesn't come off when stretched and all should be well. It worked! Just going back a stage, did you know that you can get a steering rack gaiter on without taking the track rod end out of the steering arm? Just release the clip holding the small end of the gaiter and loosen the locking nut on the track rod end. (You will need to record or preserve the position of the locking nut/track rod end or else the tracking will need re-setting afterwards.) Then simply rotate the track rod itself in the rack ball joint until the end comes free from the track rod. Simples (!) (thanks Roger!)

Duff gaiters are usually one of the items that only gets spotted by the MOT man—so if you are pre- 1960 and MOTs are a thing of the past, don't forget to check them occasionally, since a split will let the lubricating oil out and allow dirt in! Brian.

My Life with Morris Minors (by Andy Dibb)



thought I would share my experiences of my life with Minors. It will probably mirror image a lot of your memories. My first memory of the Minor was when father bought a very nice 1960 clipper blue four door. His previous cars were Singer's, Standard 8. Renault Dauphine and an early Austin Mini. The Minor was the longest he kept a car and the only time it went wrong was the gear box when yours truly was learning to drive. He finally traded it in for a mark one Vauxhall Viva and regretted it straight away.

It was at this time I learnt to drive, with dad in the Minor and one lesson a week

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with a driving school using which you probably already guessed was a Minor. Once I had passed my test I decided to sell my beloved Lambretta TV200 scooter to fund my first car purchase. I sold it for £75 and they sell for £7,000 upwards nowadays. I was offered a 1966 Morris Mini Cooper S 1275cc in almond green for £300 and what do they sell for nowadays? It was in excellent condition, well maintained and I fell in love with it, however my friendly insurance man persuaded me my first love was doomed to failure.

One of dad's friends had a Minor that needed the engine fixing and a small amount of welding. For £20 I got a 1958 4 door saloon in matt Clarendon Grey. My friend sold me a 950cc gold seal engine for £8, which friends helped me to fit and £6 for the welding got me a running car with an MOT. The matt paint finish turned out to be where it was parked under a lime tree for many years. After a whole Sunday of elbow grease and a complete tin of T cut the paint work absolutely gleamed like new.

I kept this Minor for two years and sold it for a good profit to fund the purchase of a frog-eye sprite. Finding the sprite was fun to drive but not very practical I then purchased another 2 Minor's, a dove grey 2 door and a duck egg blue 4 door. How much do mark 1 sprites go for these days?

All of this time I had served an apprenticeship as a plumber with HM Chilcott & Sons in Southampton who had a fleet of vans. No guessing what they were, yep Minors, mine was a 1968 birch grey model with sign written sides. It was totally worn out, the engine burnt so much oil I thought it might be a two stroke. We then progressed to new Marina vans, however "progressed" is probably not the right term to use!!!! Eventually my own Minor was changed for a Hillman Avenger, then various Fords and euro boxes.
