Steve and Karen were camping next to us so they hitched a lift to the pub with Ian and I where we all had a very nice meal. We awoke on the Saturday to light rain but this soon cleared leaving a nice day. Ian cooked up a smashing breakfast and we were ready for the day ahead. We left the cars on the Dorset Branch area on Branch Avenue and headed off to check out the autojumble area where I managed to pick up quite a few bits I needed for the 4 door – namely chrome items. I would much rather use decent old chrome rather than the new the stuff which only seems to last 10 minutes before it is rusty. There was a brilliant selection of Minors on site with some of my favourites being the extremely rare Domi Van from Norway and the fabulous 1953 Series II van which I have written abut elsewhere for next month's newsletter. some people are prepared to drive to attend The National with cars coming from as far as Norway, France and Germany to name but a few. There was also a good smattering of club members on site from much further afield with a lot of our American friends being in attendance. I have been friends on Facebook with John Voelker from New York for a long time but it was very nice to finally meet him in the flesh.

Outside the Chateau itself there was a brilliant selection of "significant" vehicles from Morris history. Ranging from a beautiful Bullnose Oxford right up to the last vehicle to wear the Morris badge which was actually a badge engineered Metro van. Amongst these vehicles, of course, were some very special Minors. Starting with the first Minor off the line - NWL 576 - this 2 door MM saloon was discovered by Morris Motors back in 1960 when they held a competition to find the oldest Minor still in regular use. The prize for the lucky owner of NWL 576 was a brand new Minor Million! Next to this amazing car was the fantastic MM Tourer belonging to Ray Newell. After this was the actual Millionth car – MHU 1 – and then number 1,000,0001 belonging to Martin Stoker from the Bristol (and Dorset) Branch. You may remember this car from Moggyfest 2022 as the left hand drive Million which was originally displayed at The New York Motor Show. Moving along to the next Minor we were lucky enough to have the last ever Minor saloon built which currently belongs to the MMOC and has been the subject of a full and very thorough restoration. Ian and I were taking the weight off our legs on the comfy seats in front of the Chateau when I happened to look up and see Philip Serrell from the Antiques Road Trip looking at the cars. I couldn't help myself and introduced myself to him. He turned out to be a really nice guy and was very interested in the history of our cars. He is a car enthusiast himself with both him and his wife being involved with pre-war Aston Martins etc. All too soon Saturday was coming to an end and we made our way to the tent, freshening up in the showers before a barbeque. The evening entertainment in the main marquee was a Beatles tribute act who were very good. Some of the raffle prizes were extremely good but unfortunately by the time my number came out the prize was a bottle of screen wash!

Sunday arrived, thankfully dry, and we started again! In all, over the weekend about 750 vehicles were in attendance. Several other Morris Vehicle Association member clubs were also there including The Morris Register, The 6/80 and MO Club, The Wolseley register and The Landcrab Club to name a few. 

MMOC 75th Anniversary National Rally -Brian W.



This year's Morris Minor Owners Club annual summer gathering was held at a new venue this year. It has been at Kelmarsh Hall for a number of years and a change of venue was made for this year. It was the former home of the annual Hill-Climb event which some of you might have heard of. These events ran from 1957 until 2019 and this was subsequently discontinued (like many other things!) after the Covid outbreak. It was built for John Corbett, who had become wealthy through the salt industry, in the style of a

French Chateau for his homesick French wife, and bears the date **1875**. It was opened as a hotel in 1925—(which also closed down in 2020 due to Covid). Apparently, it was suggested to the organising team that the Sunday competition could be a re-run of the hill climb. Whilst that would have undoubtedly been fun, insurance and health and safety concerns prevailed. Over the weekend, how-



ever, the grounds were attended by up to 700 plus classic cars (mostly Morris Minors). The display areas were more than usually spread out, due to the hilly nature of the site so a layout plan was helpfully provided. We took a



leisurely drive to Droitwich on Thursday and stayed 4 nights in the local Travelodge—where a few other owners were staying also. As usual it was a great opportunity to meet up with old friends and immerse oneself in the world of Morris Minors for a few days. We liked the South Cheshire Branch efforts for the themed

Friday morning, I picked up the car, checked the oil and water then filled the tank with E5. Went to Tesco for supplies, then packed up camping gear which never seems to get put away this time of year. Made a call to the insurance company to add Laurie onto the policy, which cost more in administration fees than the additional cover.

After picking up Laurie we decided upon a route and with the map in hand set off. I drove the first half up through Salisbury and onto Marlborough where we stopped off for lunch. Half of the way we followed a horse box which was by far a lot slower than us! I feared it was going to Cheltenham on the same route as us, but they pulled off just before Marlborough. Coming down the steep hill into Marlborough gave my brakes a jolly good workout to the point there was noticeable brake fade. A fully loaded car and drum brakes all-round doesn't stop going down a steep hill, I think going down the gears and using the engine to brake was more effective. After a Greggs lunch Laurie took over the driving and I navigated our way up through Swindon, Cirencester and Gloucester ending up on the A38 passing through Tewkesbury and Worcester before arriv-

ing at Droitwich Spa. Before the trip I was joking about only taking roads that were around in 1948, having managed to avoid the motorways I think we achieved it. Laurie checked the route we took on an old map he had and aside from some roads being widened into dual carriageways agreed. It took us

about 4 hours in total and half a tank of petrol, we arrived about 3pm. We were greeted at the gate and did our best to follow the signs to rally control, where we were checked in and directed to the camping field. The rally pack included a nice wooden key ring with the 75th anniversary embossed on it. On entering the camping field, we were advised to pitch away from any trees or overhanging branches, this rather distracted me from the more pressing issue of clearing pinecones from where the tent was going! It was like treading on Lego that you couldn't see all weekend. Before we put the tent up, we made some tea, someone

kindly took my 5-litre water container up the hill to the water tap and filled it up. Laurie realised that he'd left all his cutlery and mug at home. Luckily, he managed to scrounge a set from a nearby caravaner for the weekend.

The site was basically on a hillside, camping at the bottom and everything else including the water tap was at the top. There was a land train that ran constantly throughout the day up and down the hill, which we used several times.

Friday evening, we had dinner at the local pub which was a short drive down the A38. We followed the signs to the exit but found

I think we made the right choice to come back Monday, it meant we could take our time. When we

Saturday morning, we had a fry up for breakfast and then set off to look around the traders & stalls. Laurie was on the lookout for parts his latest restoration project, however I had to make sure he didn't go too overboard as there was limited space in the Traveller for trip home. I bought a chicken noodle lunch from one of the food trucks which was very nice, we had a look in the regalia tent and

bought a few things including a celebratory pin badge. We parked our cars up on Branch Avenue, where Laurie had reserved us a space. It was fun watching some of the cars trying to drive up the hill on the wet grass, a few didn't make it and slid back down again. All the displays were fairly dispersed across the site. The pickups and vans were at the bottom of the hill and were the only display I didn't get to look around.

Although there was very little rain over the weekend it was very windy. Saturday evening, we had a BBQ behind a wind break before heading up the hill for the evening entertainment. There was a Beatles tribute band interspersed with a raffle and auction, which was difficult to hear from the back of the marquee.

Sunday started with the customary fry up again. By this time, I was starting to run low on supplies of tea bags and coffee, thankfully Jacky &



lan preparing lan and Laurie's staple diet for the weekend.

Brian were able to liberate a few from their room at the Travel Lodge. We had a look around the traders and stalls again buying a few more bits. Laurie had bought a pair of rear wings, which obviously weren't going to fit in my car for the trip home! He had persuaded

Carlo to bring them back in his van. They did still end up in the back of my car though at the next club night! Meanwhile, Brian had spotted a very good engine oil deal on the ESM stand, he assured me that there was plenty of room in my car for a couple of boxes (8 x 4.5l cans) for the club spares. There was a blind driving competition that none of us were brave enough to enter, sorry Deputy Ed, no embarrassing photos from Dorset members driving over traffic cones! We had a very enjoyable day looking around all the cars and displays, chatting to the owners of a few very interesting cars that we'd not seen before. There's more about these in the other rally reports. After the prize giving, we sat by the tent watching the cars leave, before we headed off to the pub for Sunday dinner. This time the exit gate was open, and it led to a set of traffic lights which was great for getting out onto the main road.

Quite a lot of people stayed over on the Sunday evening as well. Monday morning, we packed up the tent and emptied out the car to strategically pack it all in! I hadn't envisaged bring more stuff back than I went with, but we just about managed to get it all in 2 boxes of oil and all Laurie's purchases. We headed off to the local McDonald's for breakfast before re-tracing the route we took up, this time I drove the first leg down to Marlborough.

This was only my 2nd ever trip to a National Rally, it was much better than the previous one I attended which was in Surrey near Gatwick. I think the location was great and it was a nice drive there and back. We'll wait to see where next years is, but I think that 4 hours driving is about as far as I'd want to go.


