Detection Dogs

THE 'BRIAN WOOD' REPORT (& News from the Spares Dept.)




Hello again, everyone. The donated National MMOC Morris Minor that we r ecovered in July has finally made its way up to the headquarters in Derby. We

MOTOR MUSEUM

The latest workshop project is a modification for the gearbox front cover to incorporate a modern oil seal to replace the original 'scroll' type oil seal. This has involved the early purchase of my Christmas present in the form of a lathe. The design is still being finalised, but it involves boring out the hole in the existing front cover to about 38mm and then making an aluminium sleeve which will fit in the enlarged hole and also contain a 35x23x7 oil seal. The covers are commercially available as new castings, but are a bit pricey, so, following a discussion with Branch member, Michael Tompkins (who suggested making one at home) -I decided to have a go myself using an old front cover. As you can see from the photo, the



sleeve hasn't been fitted to the cover yet, as it needs to have a small further adjustment in size.

The plan is to make it an 'interference fit' – involving heating the cover and cooling the sleeve. I am planning to fit the cover to a rebuilt 948 gearbox in due course. If it is successful, I'll make a few more and convert a few 1098 ones as well.

We now also have the new batch of reconditioned cylinder heads (with unleaded conversion and modern valve stem seals) in stock. The Club member prices are (currently) £405 for 1098 and we still have a couple of 948's at the old price of £211.50. We also should have reground crankshafts by the time you read this – prices on application.

WHAT 'BITS' DID MORRIS USE, AND FROM WHERE, TO **BUILD THE MORRIS MINOR?**



By 1961 One Million Morris Minors had been built Each car comprised of thousands of individual items -

large and small . From the start of Morris Minor production in 1948 Morris Motors had established a reliable chain of supply to smoothly supply the Cowley Oxford assembly line. Larger essential components such as bodies engines and gearboxes, radiators, carburettors etc. as we are aware were built within 'in house' own factory resources (Morris, Nuffield Organisation, then later B.M.C.) however certain established component companies were consistently and regularly relied upon to supply many specific items ... Good quality traditional ANTIFREEZE correctly diluted is most effective for extreme winter frost protection and is also designed to provide summer engine cooling that is superior than plain water alone in your radiator and engine cooling system .One other very useful function is performed by the inclusion of 'corrosion inhibitors.' .

With the temptation of many brands of later 'longer life' products on sale the Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs and the

Classic Car industry agree that 'Classic' cars *should still only use one type, being suitable for 'older' designed engines, as found in the Morris Minor :-

*THE 'TRADITIONAL' BLUE ETHYLENE GLYCOL is still a highly effective antifreeze; it contains silicates as an inhibitor to help prevent corrosion in engines with mixed metals in their make-up. Bluecol and Blue Star are well known brand names and both are declared suitable for a classic cars such as the Morris Minor. Halfords also sell this same type of anti-freeze as an 'own brand' product and is also perfectly suitable. However please be aware that there are also low- or no silicate ethylene glycol formulations (usually red) available which may not be suitable for older engines.

Propylene glycol is another well-known and less toxic antifreeze formula and usually contains silicates. However, Comma, the main manufacturer, has now discontinued it in favour of an ethylene glycol product Recently, problems have been reported concerning the use of antifreeze mixtures using Organic Acid Technology (O.A.T.) used in classic cars O.A.T. was introduced in the mid-1990s and the products are biodegradable, recyclable, do not contain either silicates or phosphates and are designed to be longer lasting. However, these products do seem to cause problems in older engines. Over and above the ability of antifreeze to find the smallest crevice and leak, O.A.T. antifreezes have been accused of destroying seals and gaskets and causing a great deal of damage in 'old' engines. For this reason, the manufacturers do not recommend their use in historic vehicles. *These products are usually* coloured red, pink or orange.


The last category is H.O.A.T. products using Hybrid Organic Acid Technology in an ethylene glycol base with some silicates in the formulation alongside the organic corrosion inhibitors. The product is usually coloured green and not recommended for use in historic vehicles.

To Summarise :-

- *Only use traditional blue coloured ethylene glycol antifreeze in historic vehicles.
- *Thoroughly flush out the system before replacing the old mixture.
- * Check the condition of all hoses for any cracks
- *Always replace the coolant if possible within the time scale specified as the corrosion inhibitors break down over time.

Traditional Blue Ethylene Glycol is recommended for the Morris Minor and when diluted correctly is designed to have a fully effective life of 2 years

Finally - there is a modern alternative 'WATERLESS' liquid coolant available that is designed not to need changing as above (e.g. Evans Waterless Coolant) If changing to this technology there is a particular grade recommended for classic cars. Also a 'prepreparation' mix should be initially used (A budget of around £100 is estimated to cover 5L of Waterless Coolant and 5L of pre-preparation treatment) **ROGER** Page 22
