Sue & Martin gardening committee and of course our Roger still full of enthusiasm producing the creative design content for the club

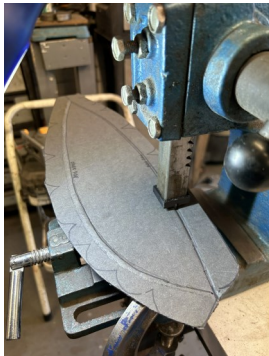
We look forward to the new year and your continued support ‘

BRIAN WOOD REPORT

Firstly can I say thanks to Roger (our Lincolnshire correspondent) for pointing out that the fan thermostat should be at the top of the cooling system and not at the bottom as mentioned in my contribution last month. I *sort of* did know that, but it took a slight nudge for me to take note of it. It was just laziness, I suppose at it is much easier to fit it in the (longer) bottom hose. Anyway, it turned out not to be the relay that was at fault, the fan thermostat itself was the problem. A new one fitted in the top hose seemed to cure the overheating problem. The difficulty there was the lack of room between the thermostat and the radiator inlet pipe which both had to be trimmed. I had to fabricate two shorter top hoses for the connection. By way of restitution (or punishment) Roger has re-sent me his articles on electric fan installation which he wrote some years ago and will be included in a future newsletter for those that are interested in finding out about fans and their installation.



The NEC Classic Car show is happening this coming weekend and our Million is being shown on the Morris Minor Owners Community Facebook page stand together with the other Millions that were displayed at the National Rally this year. I had started to carry out some 'refreshing' of the interior which had begun to look a bit sad. In particular the rear side panels were looking very tatty as the vinyl covering was coming off. Investigations revealed that the covers had very little overlap around the edges of the millboard and were almost impossible to re-glue. Rather ambitiously, I decided to make some new panels, bearing in mind I have never attempted anything much in the trimming department before.

I ordered a sheet of millboard and some vinyl covering which is a very

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good match for the existing cream coloured material. There seem to be many variations of construction for these panels. The arm-rests are made of plywood in some cars and in others, from millboard. Graham Melly showed me the ones he had for his project and they appear to be completely different to mine. Probably as mine are about 6 years younger, cost saving measures probably ensured deletion of the plywood option. The challenge then, was to find a way of folding the millboard without tearing it. I

acquired a second hand, very small 'fly press' some years ago, which is sometimes useful for pressing small bearings in or out. The aim was to impress a small channel about 2 or 3mm wide which made the fold a bit easier—together with the steam provided by a VAX 'steamer' kindly loaned by Graham Melly. Whilst it was a bit like a sauna at times I managed to make the bends without getting too many scalded fingers or cracked millboard. At the time of writing I have managed to complete both sides and fit them to the car.



As we have fitted a reversing camera on the Branch Van, I decided it was about time I put my idea of making a reversing light/camera switch into practice and currently have a working prototype. I am planning to use the van as a 'test mule' prior to making a few for club spares if successful. It seems to be another one of those things that doesn't seem to be available at present. No one appears to make a switch for the 948/1098 gearbox, although the 1275 gearbox does have the facility for a switch to be fitted. I am using the Reverse plunger plug—right at the back of the gearbox remote extension -which has to be modified to incorporate another plunger that protrudes from the back when reverse is selected. Hopefully there will be more news on that next month. Cheers for now, Brian.

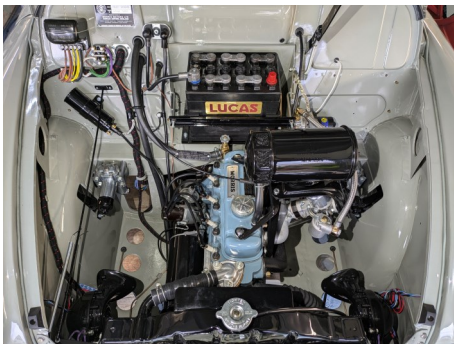
Graham Hits the Roof!



Well the last big job, the Newtons headlining I have just finished fitting and all looks good. I have to say that if anyone says it is easy to do then I can tell you it is definitely not. However I did fit one years ago and that was easy because of the proper material, but the material used by Newton Commercials is too thick and even though I used a heat gun on it to try and stretch the material on the four hoop supports it would not budge. The instructions they give are not accurate as I found out in the previous faulty lining. They say fit the plywood panel at the front that goes above the sun visors and measure 8" from the first stitched seam to the



front edge of the plywood. This is wrong and leaves too much material which will sag. So I took the route of fitting from the 7 tinny downwards pointed tags above the rear window and pulling the headlining with hoops along the side rails and making a centre mark for the plywood panel. Then on the bench mark back 1/2" from the centre mark for a bit more tension. The panel is fitted to the material with glue and staples and the two metal securing brackets are fitted with bifurcated rivets. These hold the panel in the recess rail above the front screen. I had the lining in and out four times before finally tensioning and using a heat gun to heat up any creases and sagging which nicely evens out the surface. I can see why some garages charge £400 for fitting as it is definitely a days work.



Other things that I have finished are the two rubber buffers under each front wing which I installed with the correct bifurcated rivets as per original from factory, not screws and nuts.

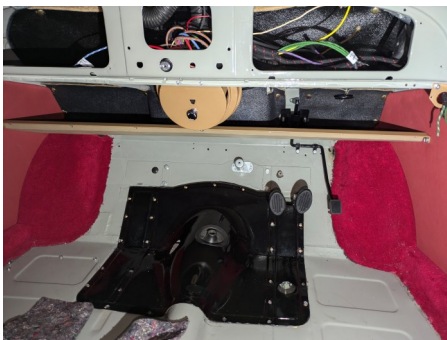

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need to be bent down to the rear to fix to the bulkhead again with the bifurcated rivets for originality and upwards onto the horizontal fixing bar with the heater



attached centrally. I have a steam gun and used that to soften the millboard which then bends easily. I had B&Q paint match a section of old shelf and this goes on the underside. The correct millboard shelf from ESM for Series 2 is the LHD one as the RHD one has the pattern on the wrong surface.

Having fitted the shelf and heater I connected the hoses to the radiator and cylinder head brass tap. I then fitted two Wind Tone, High and Low horns either side of the radiator. Oh and thankfully no leaks after adding the waterless coolant. I can now finish the dash controls, the passenger side glove box, then carpets, seats and rear side panels and the car will be ready for the road.

Bobby's story



Let's go back to 7th July 1954 and the production line at the BMC works in Cowley. A Birch Grey 2 door saloon starts her journey finally on 10th July she entered the daylight for the first time. She was dispatched to Wadhams Limited in Southampton on 12th July 1954 and registered as NCR 86 to her

first owner on 14th July and so began her life.

The first 2 years are a mystery unfortunately but in 1956 Bob Ellery was on the lookout for a replacement for his 1930 Morris Minor 2 seater when he came across NCR being advertised for the princely sum of £60! Why so cheap? Well, there was a great dent in the bonnet! This didn't worry Bob as he had worked as a mechanic in Cornwall before the war. After, in Bournemouth, where he now lived with his wife, Eileen, a new bonnet was fitted and so began a motoring era which was to last for the next 60 years. At first Bob was perfectly happy with NCR as she was still a relatively new car apart from visiting the local tyre depot to have some new rubber "glued" onto the tyres and regular servicing she was providing very reliable motoring.

Enter the 1960's and thinking that Eileen may be wanting to drive the car and with the advent of the new flashing indicator Bob set about making his own set of flashers for NCR. Now as well as being a skilled mechanic,



Bob was also a skilled radio engineer – he had even made their first television set back in 1953 to watch the coronation. This he made out of a radar screen so instead of black and white they had a green and white one! Using his expertise as a radio

engineer he set about making his own flasher unit – this is still in place and working to this day! He also made all the light fittings including turning all the bolts and threads himself. At the back of the car instead of having the lamps flush with the wing they are mounted on plinths to bring them into line with the original rear lights – these plinths are made out of stainless steel sugar bowls. At the same time as installing the flashing indicators Bob decided to make and install a radio in NCR. As well as the radio he

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even made his own aerial! Once again, both of these things are still providing sterling service all these years later. His own electronic ignition unit was also made and fitted. Sadly, this is no longer working but still exists and is safely tucked away in the shed. He also made a rev counter and an ammeter which are both still fitted. So, once again with regular servicing and a liberal coating of used engine oil underneath to prevent the dreaded and infamous Minor tin worm NCR continued providing Bob and Eileen with reliable, albeit slow, motoring. Enter the 1970's and Bob thought that he might like a newer car now. He started looking around at newer Minors but when he found out that he'd be lucky to get £5 or £10 as a part exchange allowance he decided that he might as well keep on driving NCR until she fell apart especially as Eileen had recently purchased a brand new Volkswagen Camper which she was using meaning that the Minor was only really used by Bob now for his daily commute to work. By now the paintwork was starting to look past its best but there was still no rust anywhere thanks to the amount of oil painted everywhere! Bob decided to do his own respray using a spray kit which attached to the vacuum cleaner of all things! Although, far from a perfect finish it tidied NCR up considerably. In 1976 the fledgling Morris Minor Owners Club was formed which Bob joined and subsequently became one of the founding members of the Dorset Branch upon its formation in 1980 becoming a very active member in its early years and remaining a member until his death.

With the arrival of the 1980's NCR was still in regular use clocking up many miles every year and was still being used by Bob for his daily commute until he retired. With the Minor now becoming a collector's car after market accessories were becoming more popular. Bob bought and fitted a stainless steel exhaust system but mounted it using hand wound springs instead of the usual fabric straps. A "Petrol Economiser" was also fitted along with stainless steel sill covers, stainless steel window surrounds and wheel trims. Bob also made new carpets for NCR as the originals were now somewhat past their best. NCR was now only used locally for shopping trips and trips to the allotment, rarely, if ever, leaving Bournemouth.

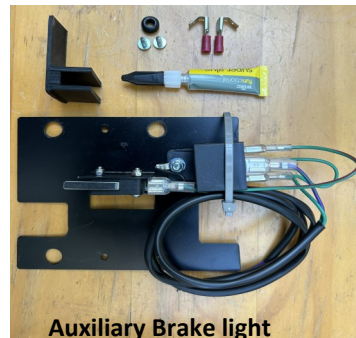
